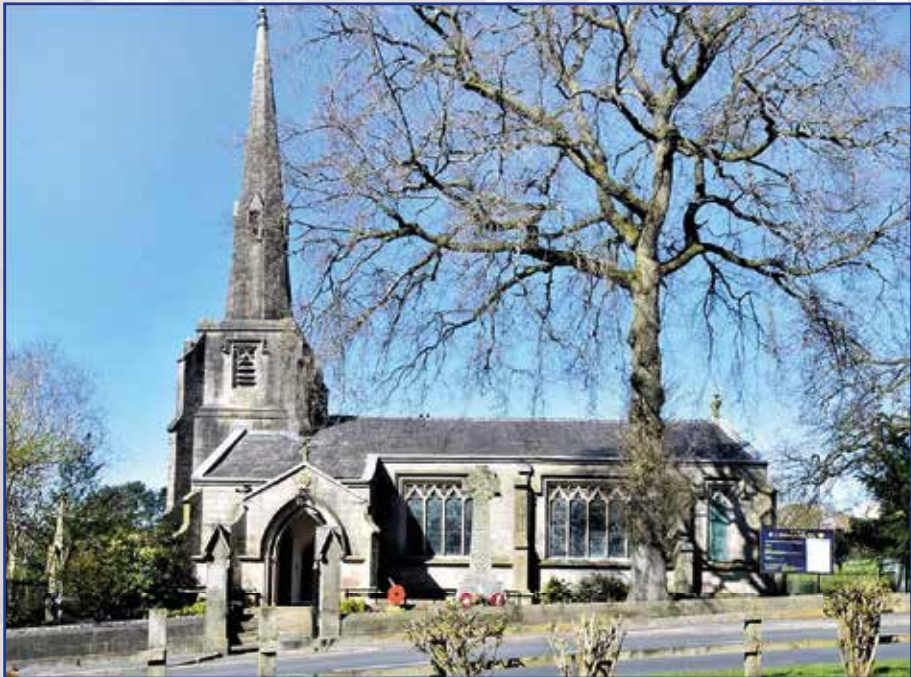

WARDENS REPORT

Happy New Year to you and your families. I hope you had a healthy and peaceful Christmas.

What a fantastic early Christmas present we received at Immanuel with the announcement of the appointment of Bryn Naylor as our new Priest in Charge and once the United Benefice with St Francis is formalised, he will become the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

There has been much surprise within church circles that we will have Bryn within six months of David leaving, in direct contrast to many parishioners who thought we would have someone within a few weeks. This quick appointment comes as a result of the Vision 2026 initiative whereby Blackburn Diocese has refused to manage decline and has been actively training curates in preparation for the moving on and retiring of clergy, especially given the age profile. Blackburn Diocese is seen as a place to come to for clergy, which is a momentous change from years gone by.

Bryn is a family man; his wife is Rhiannon and they have three children. He has undertaken his Curacy at Hoghton and Higher Walton. Originally from Darwen he moved away to go to university and is a very talented linguist, working in that field before his calling to ministry. The family will live in a new vicarage on Lomond Gardens as the current vicarage is no longer suitable for many reasons.

Bryn will be officially welcomed on the 11th of March 2024 at Immanuel Church.

In other news we had some excellent Christmas Services, the Café Church Toy Service, joint Nine Lessons and Carols, Crib and Christingle and Christmas Day Eucharist, all of which have seen positive feedback given. The Archdeacon attended the Toy Service, which Sandy ran and I have been advised that he subsequently was singing its praises at a Diocesan meeting saying how much he had enjoyed it. There are photos in the magazine of a selection of these services.

There are several people I would like to thank for their support over the last year but especially since September when we have not had a vicar; Peter Hodgkinson, Sandy Woods, Linda Moulden, Judith Marsh and not forgetting Diane, who has tried to keep me on track with the many things that need to be thought about.

It is also good to see people volunteer to undertake some of the 'jobs list' and I will continue to push this as it needs us all to participate, even if it is only in a small way. If one of our eldest members can be an active PCC member and attend Deanery Synod, then there is something everyone can contribute. I have advised Bryn that I do not want him undertaking 'admin', his role is 'vicaring', I will probably be advised that there is no such word but I think you will all understand what I mean by it and from your own working days have the experience of being bogged down by things you should not have been doing.

I remember some years ago reading a book to a group of children called 'The What If Monster'. The What If Monster whispered into children's ears fears of doom and dread and so infected every situation.

What if - I get scared?

What if - I get lost?

What if - it all goes wrong?

Now that may have been a children's book, but it seems to me the What If Monster has been quite busy in our world in recent years with stories and fears of dread and doom and perhaps, as 2024 begins, the What If Monster has got himself busy with you?



What if - these terrible conflicts we are seeing in Gaza and Ukraine, spill over and become global configurations?

What if - the fragile seeds of economic recovery come to nothing?

What if - fuel prices rocket again and give us all trouble with our finances?

What if - the big elections coming up in 2024 in this country and in the United States increase social division?

What if - there is another pandemic?

What if - it all goes wrong? What if ...? What if ...? What if ...?

It is so easy to make ourselves feel anxious and afraid with those fears. I was struck in contrast, therefore, by a picture which was given to me by a friend early this year. It says, '... but what if it all goes right?' Now, if you take off the 'what if' that's actually quite a powerful statement of the Christian faith, because Christians believe that it WILL all go right. It will all go right because of the child whose birth we have just been celebrating, Jesus Christ. Jesus grows up to give his life away upon the cross and, as Jesus dies, He destroys death and sin and evil and all that is at enmity with human flourishing. And so he rises again to a whole new way of life; a new creation. In Jesus we know the future. In Jesus



we know that we are safe in Him. In Jesus we know that it will all go right. And it is in that calm, assurance and that confidence in the future can reach its way back to fill our present with joy. So what would it mean to live 2024 through another set of 'what ifs'?

'What ifs', not of dread and doom but 'what ifs' of joy.

What if - 2024 was to be a year of peace? We all can do something to achieve that, as we work for peace in our communities and homes and places of work.

What if - 2024 was to be a year of justice? Again, we can all work for that as we give voice to the poor, as we serve and meet human need.

What if - 2024 was to be a year of stronger families? We can do something about that too as we give attention to our families and show them just how much we love them and just how much we care.

What if - 2024 was to be the year when you explored a little bit deeper, to live your life with Jesus Christ and to know the assurance - the joy - that comes from following Him and knowing that your future is safe in Him.

I hope you all have a really Happy New Year and a good 2024. And I hope that this can be a year when you can see that, in Jesus, things will all go right.

KNITTING FOR THE BABIES OF UKRAINE

Hello everyone, I thought I would give you an update on knitting baby hats for Ukraine and the update below from Dr Natalia which she is pleased to send to you. Once again, a very big thank you to everyone who donated wool. Hopefully, I will have reached my new goal of 1000 hats soon - I will let you know. With thanks, Marje Williams.

Dear Natalia,

Hope you and Dr Tetyana are well and that donations are still coming to you to help the people of Ukraine.

I am just preparing another box of baby hats ready to send to you. I have now personally knitted 840 hats; I was going to stop at 500 but decided to carry on until I have knitted 1000 hats for the babies of Ukraine. My friend Sheila also added another 175 hats to that number. Hope it helps in some small way.

Dear Marje,

Thank you very much for your kind wishes, your very generous offer and your continued support of Ukraine. We are so grateful! We would be delighted to receive your beautiful baby hats. Please thank your friend Sheila on our behalf!

Here is a brief update about our recent projects which you requested. Apart from sending humanitarian aid donated to us by the British people, there are a few more things which we have achieved in the last twenty months so far. Please feel free to share this information with your friends and the Church magazine readers.

- 1) we sent 20 lorries, 50 ambulances, 35 cars, 46 vans and 1 plane loaded with medical and humanitarian aid to Ukraine;**
- 2) with the help of volunteers from Plast London, AUGB London branch and Support Ukraine, we assembled and sent more than 34,000 First Aid Kits;**
- 3) we procured and delivered more than 250 ambulances and evacuation vehicles to Ukraine;**
- 4) we covered the cost of petrol for more than 140 ambulances, procured by us and our partner organisations;**
- 5) we delivered medical equipment worth c. £1 million, including baby incubators, VAC machines, ultrasounds, and anaesthetic machines, and other medical equipment, which was either procured by us or donated to us, to a number of hospitals in Ukraine;**
- 6) medical supplies and equipment were delivered to Lviv, Mykolaiv, Kyiv, Kharkiv, Dnipro, Odesa, Zhytomyr, Poltava, Kremenchuk, Bila Tserkva, Volnovakha, Chernyiv, Uman, Kherson as well as Bratislava and a number of hubs in Poland;**
- 7) we have been supporting the Ukrainian refugees in the UK and covered the cost of hot meals for 6 weeks for 350 new pupils from the displaced Ukrainian families who now attend St Mary's Ukrainian School on Saturdays in London;**
- 8) we have procured 40 generators and 19 eco flow power stations to help Ukrainians cope with the aftermath of Russian attacks.**

Which Way To Turn?

(A compass for life)

Many readers will have experience of Satellite Navigation Systems often known as 'Sat-Nav or GPS.' This piece of modern technology often found inbuilt in the car, or as part of some personal communicator 'App' or as a hand-held device. All these devices rely on mathematics which evolved centuries ago probably around 3000 BC. Today sophisticated algorithms have been constructed which make triangulation a precise science. The early Greeks gave us the word 'Geometry' from the Greek language to measure the earth. If you are lost during your car journey and are fortunate to have 'Sat-Nav' or a mobile 'App' it most certainly will use triangulation of satellite data and/or mobile phone mast to give you a precise location providing the system is up to-date with the topography.



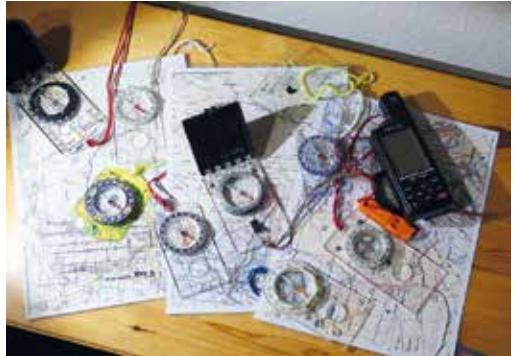
Many readers of these ramblings will by now know that wandering across open moors and hills is an enjoyable pass-time of mine. However, I do not rely on this technology for guidance, I prefer the reliable Earth's magnetic field - a map and compass. Navigation and an

understanding to know what our earth was like and what treasures it might hold dates back to the earliest of religions. The earliest map I hold is a copy of the 'Mappa Mundi' compiled about 1300 AD. If you are interested in this map, it is in Hereford Cathedral. If you look at the map closely you might have noticed that the centre of the world is centred around Jerusalem. This map was not intended to explore the world but to guide pilgrims towards the holy city of Jerusalem.

Knowing what you want to do is just as important as knowing how to get there. Many years ago, when I believed that I was invincible when seeking adventure, I was struggling with my 'can do' attitude, lack of experience and not understanding how to use the most basic of navigational aids. I was lost when an elderly man came



to my rescue. "What's up son?" "I'm not sure where I am" I replied. His first question was where do you want to go? Sheepishly my response was not that clear. With a hint of sarcasm, the gent said, "You are probably in the right place." He then gave me some simple rules, after which he set me on the right path to find where I had pitched the tent.



- Know where you are before you set off.
- Know what you want to achieve.
- Have a means of guidance - (map and compass)
- Be able to understand the guidance.
- Lastly do not be afraid to turn back and live to have another go.

Following this advice, I have enjoyed remote places, marvelled at the silence of walking in foggy weather and the relief of when to turn back, especially when the weather is greater than my invincibility.

For those exploring the UK, be assured we have access to some of the best maps of any country in the world. Take a minute to consider the difficulty that early mariners struggled with. They knew where they had set off from, they knew what they wanted to achieve, the means of guidance was a little sketchy, ingenuity was abundant and turning back was not an option.

Many of the early mariners that we revere were determined men of Christian faith and for many it was their faith, determination, national recognition and riches that kept them going despite the odds stacked against them. Today

sailing the oceans is an exercise in technology. But in the early days of Vasco-da-Gama, Magellan, James Cook etc, they navigated the world by using anything that would guide them. Sun, stars, wind, time compass and even birds would be used for guidance. I would not like to put my faith in these seemingly random bits of information. However, in skilled hands success in finding land was assured.



What about navigation in the desert? On foot a good magnetic compass and a watch might provide a successful guide to your destination, but in a vehicle a magnetic compass does silly things. The answer is a sun compass, the most famous of which is perhaps the 'Bagnold' sun compass. These simple devices, when used with a good time-keeping watch, saved many lives during WW2 whilst navigating deserts.



Not all navigation relies on technology, sophisticated or simple. Nature has already equipped many creatures with the ability to cover the world and return to the same place year after year, Atlantic salmon, Arctic Terns, geese, herding animals, European eel and turtles to name but a few. Man has tried hard to work out conclusively how these natural

navigation systems work, and still research goes on.

Not all navigation is about the physical aspects of geography. The Labour MP and Prime Minister Gordon Brown gave us the phrase 'moral compass.' I think most of us understood the meaning but what did Gordon Brown mean? When you consider this phrase and apply it to yourself, those five rules for safe navigation still apply but take on new meaning.

I once had the opportunity to go into a Synagogue and on the wall where our altar would be a plaque. In Hebrew was written the first words of each line of the 'Ten Commandments.' This we were told was to remind worshipers of the guidelines for living as God instructed – different form of compass. If you consider the fundamental 'Ten Commandments' and compare them with the laws of most civilised countries, they form the requirements for living together with relative harmony. If you consider the rules the elderly gentleman gave me, rules for safe navigation in the hills, and compare them side by side with the commandments I can see a connection.



Perhaps I was in the right place at the right time to meet the right person who gave me the right guidance. Please do not be afraid to be different you do not have to follow the well-trodden and often eroded paths. Know who you are, where you want to go and how you intend to get there and enjoy the journey and navigation by whatever means you choose.

3) Join the 100 Club; - ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS NOW DUE

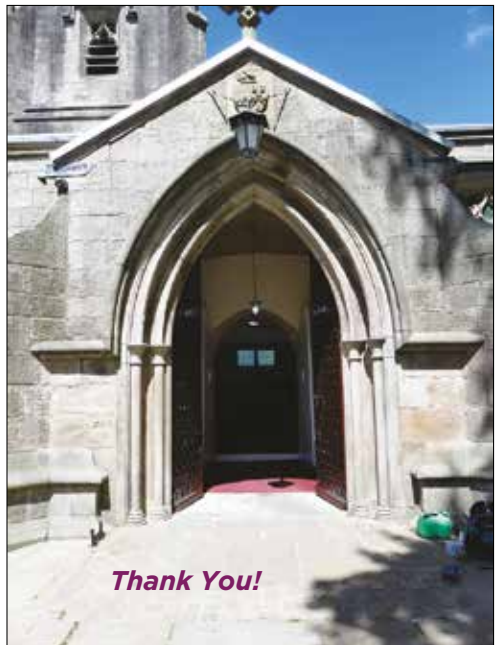
