THE VICAR

Dear Friends,

This month we celebrate Jesus' transfiguration, when Jesus took Peter, John and James with Him up a mountain to pray (Luke 9:28-36). Jesus was transfigured alongside Moses and Elijah: 'As He was praying, the appearance of His face changed, and His clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning.' (29).

Jesus' Transfiguration: Watch!

The disciples' eyes were opened, as Jesus' hidden divinity was revealed. The presence of Moses and Elijah confirmed Him as God's promised Messiah, who fulfilled God's plan and purposes. By foreshadowing the cross, resurrection and ascension, this event powerfully calls us to entrust our lives into Jesus' hands to experience His presence and power.

The Father's Word: Listen!

There came a voice from the cloud covering them: 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him.' (35). God affirmed His love and call on Jesus, as His beloved and chosen Son. This is the second time God spoke audibly about Jesus (cf Luke 3:22), but on this occasion He was speaking for the benefit of the disciples. Do we hear God speaking these same words to us? We listen to what Jesus says to us, knowing that like Him we are deeply loved and accepted by God.

The Disciples Response: Learn!

'The disciples kept this to themselves and did not tell anyone at that time what they had seen' (36). They were impacted by this experience and needed time to reflect on what they had seen and heard about Jesus. Eight days before they were asked by Jesus: 'Who do you say I am?' (Luke 9:20). In the transfiguration their understanding of Jesus was being transformed. As we reflect on Jesus' ministry, to encounter the real Jesus, we are also transformed.

'No one who meets Jesus ever stays the same.' (Philip Yancey)

WARDENS REPORT

The new Bishop of Blackburn was installed in a service held on Saturday the 24th of July in the Cathedral where the Dean undertook all the formal parts under licence from the Archbishop of York. This was the first time that children had been welcomed at this service in the Blackburn Diocese and was followed by afternoon tea in the grounds for over 1000 people. It was a very enjoyable service with the Choir excellent as usual and a most eatable afternoon tea. Personally, I am not a huge fan of the Latin parts (brings back memories of not liking studying it at school) and always feel more of a spectator than a participant when I attend a service at the Cathedral.

When you receive this magazine, we will have had the crowning of our new Rose Queen Summer with her retinue of Martha, Annabella, Reeva and Hugo at our now annual Crowning and Dog Show event. In a strange quirk Summer will be Immanuel Rose Queen exactly 20 after her mum Nicola undertook the role. Things have certainly changed within that time both in society and within the church. Hopefully, we will have had some great weather on the day because as well as providing Immanuel with a platform to engage with the community it raises vital funds for the church.

Following the Annual General Meeting I was once again voted to be Warden for another 12 months, not that anyone else stood to be elected, so you are stuck with me for another year. The Archdeacon's Visitation was held at Immanuel Oswaldtwistle church where the Wardens for Accrington & Blackburn with Darwen Deanery were inducted on masse rather than individually being presented to him as previously.

The day to day running of the church and its buildings does take up considerable amounts of time and the amounts of things having to be dealt with are many and wide ranging and I am not sure I could list them all if I tried as regularly new things crop up. I must say a huge thank you to Peter Hodkinson for all the jobs he does many of which ease the running of church and save lots of money.

The latest problem I have been attempting to solve is the updating of the Book of Remembrance, which needs someone with a calligraphical style of handwriting to undertake. May I ask please that should you know someone who does have this style you approach them and ask if they would be willing to undertake for church.

The Narthex creation at the rear of the church which should be mainly paid for by the legacy left by Margaret Whalley is edging closer to Diocesan agreement and hopefully after a site visit at the end of June they will be satisfied and able to agree to allow us to proceed in July.

'GIFTS'

Not always what they appear

David our Vicar gave a sermon that spoke of gifts and the value of gifts. It was at this point that I remember a time when I visited Germany on works business and felt that it would be a worthwhile learning a little (kleine) of the German language. The first aspect of the German language is the similarities in sounds but not the meaning. Gift is German for poison, not the sort of gift you would like to receive. Even if the language variance is a problem, picking up the wrong bottle if you are poorly sighted was certainly recognised in Victorian times. Poison bottles had a distinctive shape to avoid the gift of a bottle of Prosecco as against nasty embrication. In today's excessively safety conscious world we appear to have lost the



desire to make nasty products easy for the poorly sighted. They have to be able to read 'Braille'. Gone have the ribbed octagonal/hexagonal bottles of a by-gone times. This is not the sort of gift you would wish to receive regardless of language differences.

Most of you who read my ramblings will have received gifts for Christmas, Birthdays or Anniversaries. This is the area of physical gifts, some you treasure others you don't.


At this point it appeared to me that gifts could be categorised into groups

Gifts you did not want or need

Gifts that you treasure(d) and perhaps still hold onto - Physical gifts Gifts that are symbolic - Gifts that are virtual

The first might be the poison (gift) but is more likely to be to be a birthday or Christmas present. Handkerchiefs spring to mind, embellished such that each time you use them you draw attention to the fact that you are not well. Perhaps it is a pair of socks made from a material that your feet do not get on with. Cotton socks I dislike. Perhaps a pair of gloves that don't fit. All these gifts are given with good intent and you say how nice they are, as you hope your nose will not grow as did poor Pinocchio's. You wonder how long must I hold onto them before I off load to a charity shop in the hope that some person can make better use of them.

My first treasured gift is a book given on an early birthday 'British Birds and their nests' form the publisher 'Ladybird Senior' series circa 1953. The book was compiled by Brian Vesey Fitzgerald F.L.S. In the printed forward the author concludes by saying "good hunting". Not PC today, however, this comment set me on course to love, enjoy and cherish our wildlife. As a child of this era every day was now special. I wanted to know more about our common birds. A picture of a nest with eggs was not enough. I wanted to see them for real. When I found a nest, I would check its



progress until the sad day came when the chicks would fly away.



Memories of gifts are somewhat thin, but the next was one of those gifts that the giver (my parents) wished they could have avoided. After considerable pestering one Christmas they presented me with a No5 Meccano Set. A million ideas in a box. I could now build whatever I wanted – not enough parts. So, a list of extension kit was on the wish list of gifts/presents. It is only when my parents realise that parts need oiling and that running them on the carpet or on the 'all terrain' cushions leave marks. They then wished I would have liked football! It is often said it is better to give than to receive, I'm not sure. With pester power now a well-established art form 'I needed a bicycle' Santa eventually succumbed and a bike duly appeared. Not the sports bike I had in mind more a street bike. Who cares by 05:00 on Christmas day the bike and I were inseparable by the time my parents woke up I had covered ten or more miles riding round the streets of terraced houses. Soon the bike was to be converted to have 'drop handlebars' lightweight mud guards, panniers and toe clips. All of this was essential for the grand tour of the English lakes. The bike remained a treasured gift until I was 19 or 20 when motorisation took over.



When marriage comes along you make promises and affirm these promises with an exchange of gifts – wedding rings. If I have to take my wedding ring off and clean it from the debris of gardening or car-repair, I feel it's missing presence and have to restore it as quickly as possible. I claim this to be the reason I don't make pastry. Perhaps you received a certificate for your endeavours, a degree, diploma, swimming certificate

or a confirmation card/gift. The certificate is just a piece of paper with a few

words and official symbols, but to the owner this simple gift might open the door to employment or simply say I did this.

In marriage and sometimes not, children appear. To me these are some of the great gifts and mysteries of life. You don't own children but as parents and grandparents you try to bestow gifts upon them. Some gifts they don't like i.e., self-discipline, others like confidence and education they value later in life, whilst all the time, you as the giver get to enjoy their developing character. Photos often evoke memories of



events past; however, you see a photo and think of the friendship of those in the photo. As time passes by and those days of friendship in the photo remind you of change, the gift of friendship has not been destroyed but is merely sleeping. Friendship and faith are among the greatest of gifts. You develop a bond which might last a lifetime or until circumstance move you in different directions. You have faith in your friends that they will be there if you need them, I especially felt this in those carefree days of climbing and caving, when deep underground or when hanging from a rope the gift of friendship and faith become one. You don't have to climb or cave to experience this gift but I hope you all have memories of the great gift of life

At his point I will say keep giving you will be surprised at what you might receive.

Thanks for putting up with my ramblings.



The Installation of Our New Bishop



Rt Rev. Philip North

Bishop Philip was educated at the University of York and trained for ministry at St Stephen's House, Oxford. He served his title at St Mary the Virgin in the Diocese of Durham and was ordained priest in 1993. In 1996 +Philip took up the role of Vicar at Holy Trinity and St Mark's Hartlepool and was also appointed Area Dean of Hartlepool in 2000. In 2002 +Philip was appointed Priest Administrator of the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, in the Diocese of Norwich, before being appointed Team Rector of the Parish of Old St Pancras, in the Diocese of London, in 2008. Immediately prior to becoming Bishop of Blackburn +Philip was Bishop of Burnley; a role he was appointed to in 2015.

During his vibrant and colourful Installation Service at Blackburn Cathedral on Saturday, June 24, Rt Rev Philip North lived out a pledge he made when initially announced as the tenth Bishop of Blackburn in January; to place children and young people at the heart of all we do as a Diocese. From the very moment he arrived in the Cathedral, until the end of a service attended by more than 1000 people from across the County, including many civic, community and faith leaders, it was the voices of the young that were heard most loudly. It is thought to be the first time such an event specifically for children has been held at the same time as a main Installation Service in any Cathedral. Organised by the Diocesan Board of Education, it was a fun variation of the well-known 'Messy Church' that has grown in popularity in recent years and it allowed the children present to learn about the Bible and Jesus through play and craft.

Meanwhile the main service itself (the Eucharist of the Holy Spirit) was sung by the Cathedral Choir alongside the Cathedral Youth Choir and, as guests first arrived, children from the following schools were also singing:

- Langho and Billington St. Leonard's, Church of England Primary School
- Salesbury Church of England Primary School
- St Aidan's Church of England Primary Academy, Blackburn
- St. Christopher's Church of England High School, Accrington (Year 7)
- St. John's Church of England Primary School, Cliviger



At 2.00pm precisely Bishop Philip, as is tradition for a new Diocesan Bishop, knocked loudly on the West Door of the Cathedral with an ancient Saxon hammer before being allowed to enter. He was met by three young people from St Luke's Church in Blackburn (Ollie, Lacey and Kenzie) who offered greetings and led the moment of Welcome alongside with the entire congregation who had turned to face the West Door. Later in the service the First Reading from the Bible was delivered by Maayana Cox and Oscar Newby from All Saints, New Longton and children continued to be to



Diocesan links from South Africa and Germany) alongside many Mayors and Mayoresses, council leaders, faith and community representatives. From the Diocese, alongside Bishop Philip was Rt Rev. Dr Jill Duff, Anglican Bishop of Lancaster; the Dean of Blackburn, Very Rev. Peter Howell-Jones; the Venerable Mark Ireland, Archdeacon of Blackburn; the Venerable David Picken, Archdeacon of Lancaster; Dean of Women's Ministry, Rev. Anne Beverley; the Bishop's Adviser on UKME issues and Deacon for the Installation

the fore. Towards the end of the service Bishop Philip led a Messy Installation procession through the Cathedral and down the nave, with the youngsters all wearing colourful home-made mitres (Bishop's hats). The Bishop also donned a stunning purple cloak made for him during the Messy Installation by the children. Notable figures attending the service on Saturday included the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire, Rt Hon. The Lord Shuttleworth KG KCVO and Lady Shuttleworth as well as Speaker of the House of Commons and MP for Chorley, the Rt Hon. Sir Lindsay Hoyle. Other guests were the High Sheriff of Lancashire, Mr David Taylor CBE; The Venerable Joshua Skee and Rev. Martin Stützer (representing our



Service, Rev. Sarah Gill and many clergy and their parishioners from across Lancashire. As well as clergy and civic processions; those in attendance and watching online via the livestream also



witnessed the Oaths of Allegiance by Bishop Philip to His Majesty the King and to the Archbishop of York; the 'Installation' itself when the new Bishop takes his episcopal seat (the 'Cathedra') in the Cathedral and also the Presentation, when Bishop Philip was presented as the new Bishop of Blackburn to the congregation. Speaking in his sermon about



the importance placing children, voung people and our schools at the 'very heart of our common life' Bishop Philip said: "The Church often engages in ministry to the young as a kind of insurance policy. We do it to make the adults feel a bit better about themselves because it suggests the church may have a future. "But the desire for institutional survival is the wrong starting point. The right starting point is the Gospel song all ages can sing together. "We want young people to be inspired by the person of Jesus. This wonderful

current generation, so many of them in this cathedral today, is a searching one. They are asking profound and challenging questions about purpose, about relationships, about the future of

the planet. "Christians believe the goal of that searching is found in relationship with Jesus.

So let's create the spaces where we can have those conversations." And Bishop Philip added: "Imagine every parish engaging in ministry to the young. Imagine a network of children and youth workers supporting that ministry across Lancashire. Imagine too, an even closer partnership between churches and our amazing family of church schools for the benefit of the young. "But equally, we want young people to inspire the church. So, let's create the places where young people can pray, worship, sing and lead." As well as



an emphasis on children and young people at the heart of all we do, during the sermon Bishop Philip also placed the spotlight on social justice and the importance of proclaiming the Gospel to the whole County of Lancashire. He previously declared all three as key aims to be 'labouring tirelessly' for in the years to come when he was first announced as the new Bishop in January this year. After the service was over, clergy from across the diocese gathered for one of the largest ever group pictures of Lancashire clergy ever taken; while the entire congregation was invited to a community picnic in the Cathedral grounds. Bishop Philip chose two charities as part of the celebration service; they are SportsReach and Ambassadors Football UK.
